We light this third candle to remember ourselves this Christmas time.

God of Hope, we are carrying heavy burdens. We hold anxiety about our world in our bones. We carry guilt for where we have fallen short. We bend under the weight of loneliness and despair. God of Hope, hold our hand. Teach us to trust your strong and steady love, giving courage to name what weighs us down and handing it to you. Shine your light into the shadows of our despair and remind us that while the night may be dark, the dawn will come.
